

He says, “I don’t know the person’s name, his branch of service, or where he served when he suffered the loss of his limbs, and I understood from passersby that the explosion actually caused him hearing loss. But I can tell you that I saw several more Wounded Warriors (one soldier I saw lacked his left leg and his left arm) and I have participated in other death marches where the WWs have beaten me into the finish line.”

Supervisors Training for Success

The New Mexico Corrections Department has many leaders. They are spread out throughout offices and facilities statewide. Supervisors are by nature in leadership roles, but what does it really mean to lead? The week long training, “Essential Skills for New Supervisors” was an opportunity to answer that question and begin to invest into the future of our organization.

The training was delivered by Denis Porter, Programs Manager for the New Mexico Corrections Department and Brent Parker, Director of the Colorado Corrections Training Academy, to nearly two dozen NMCD staff. The employees came from

all over the state including Santa Fe, Los Lunas, Clovis, Silver City, Farmington and Las Cruces. More importantly, the men and women are supervisors at the NMCD’s Correctional facilities, Probation and Parole offices and Central office.

Porter said, “This actually was participatory so people were involved. They learned skills that can make them more effective at work and more effective as leaders.”

The training was aimed specifically at building leadership and management skills for NMCD supervisors. It was also an opportunity to learn about the challenges and successes of NMCD co-workers. Probation and Parole officers discovered why camaraderie among Correctional Officers can be a life line inside prison walls. Correctional Officers heard about heavy case loads Probation and Parole officers deal with and learned about the offender house visits that could turn dangerous at any moment.

Probation and Parole Supervisor Lisa Morales traveled from Carlsbad, New Mexico, to attend the training. She thinks it should be mandatory for it to be mandatory for every supervisor.

Morales said “it really gave us an insight as to the issues and challenges that Correctional Officers go through on a daily basis and some of those issues and concerns are not different from Probation and Parole. We found we shared common ground.”

“All the participants brought a different perspective depending on their field,” said Porter.

The NMCD leadership knows continued education can enhance our work environment. Two years ago, a Mexican drug cartel expert was brought in to speak to staff. Last year, there was an “Active Shooter” training, with about 200 people from 24 agencies.

Porter focused this year’s “Essential Skills for New Supervisors,” on giving supervisors tools that they can use to encourage and teach their employees. It showed supervisors that leading means inspiring others to be the best at what they do. It taught leaders that in order to expect ethical behavior they must show it themselves first.

Central New Mexico Corrections Facility Administrative Law Judge and Disciplinary Grievance Officer Larry Phillips said “the training was invaluable in that it re-enforced my skill set and helped me progress within the organization and develop the necessary peer support.”

He added, “it re-emphasized the fundamental skills for a supervisor, knowing how to approach your employees in a respectable manner while at same time maintaining policies and standards of the department.”

To find out what NMCD staff think of the training they receive, Porter passes around questionnaires after each training course.

”This actually had the highest results of feedback of any of the training we have ever done,” he said.

The training was such a success that Porter hopes to have more training like it before the end of the year.

Recidivism Reduction Graduation

In a small room at Central New Mexico Correctional Facility in Los Lunas prison inmates, Warden Joe Garcia, prison staff, educators and even the New Mexico Corrections Department Secretary and Deputy Secretary celebrated. It was Monday March April 2nd and they were marking the graduation of the most recent Recidivism Reduction class.

Level One Programs Manager Ronda Lucero explained that the thirteen inmates who graduated from the 3 month class earned at least one hundred hours to get a lump sum award for the class. The inmates got more than lump sum awards though, Lucero said many of them opened up about things they had locked up and stored away in a deep place within themselves. She saw some breakthroughs that she hopes will have a long-lasting effect.

“I’m optimistic it will help them once they are released into the community, that they can look back on what they learned in the class to help them deal with the stresses of life so that they don’t end up back in prison,” said Lucero.

Charlene Knipfing, Director of the Office of Recidivism Reduction, said 330 inmates have taken the Recidivism Reduction class. The class has been available at several facilities statewide.

Knipfing said, “Our hope is that every inmate leaving the prison will take this program.”

Last week 7 inmates graduated from the recidivism reduction class at the Penitentiary of New Mexico in Santa Fe. These inmates are level 6 inmates and those considered the greatest threat to the New Mexico Corrections Department.

PNM Warden James Lopez said of the inmates, “there was a positive change. These are inmates who are preparing to get out into the community. As long as they continue to work on the things they learned in the class they have a greater chance of success.”
